Marbles... I was the Ricky Ponting of Marbles... Rugby League... Later I went on to play in the position of "left right out"

My cultural background is half cast, yea my Dad was Dutch and my Mum was an Aussie.

When I was at Sunnybank I remember students with the following cultural backgrounds:

We had an aboriginal girl in our class and she had beautiful skin, so did the Russian kid.

I travelled to and from school by shanks pony.

For my lunch I usually had peanut butter sandwiches, still do.

When I was at school good behaviour was rewarded by being told that I had done well.

If you did the wrong thing you were punished by the threat of the cuts, sometimes six of the best.

I went on to secondary education at Sunnybank State High School.

After leaving school I

I went on to the QIT to do a drafting course and then on to an Engineering Degree that I didn't, but should have finished. I have sold lots of things in my life and customer service is very important in our modern commercial world.

The main things in my life now are:
